#### **BC Welcomes New Students**

- Ariadna Aimee Rodríguez López will enter her third year at the University of Guanajuato in the field of culture and art. She is our first student to pursue a career in the humanities.

- Jennifer Rodríguez Vega will study political science at the University of Guanajuato.
- Jorge Humberto Martínez González will study mathematics, also at the University of Guanajuato.

# The Board of Directors Meets New Challenges

The following BC members were elected to board positions at the annual meeting in February:

AJ Buckingham, President, has been involved with BC since 2014, including serving as vice president from 2016-18.

She is a clinical psychologist who lived and worked in Chicago before moving to Guanajuato in 2014. Her work history includes 14 years as a director in a large social service agency that served people who were homeless and refugees.

David Spencer, Vice President, moved to Guanajuato from Salt Lake City in 2018. He is bilingual, having spent his youth in the Mormon Colonies in Chihuahua, as well as living and working in Barcelona for a number of years. He has a professional background that



extends from office management to acting in both drama and musical theater.

Anna Adams, Secretary, has lived in Guanajuato since 2007. She is a founding member of BC and previously served as president. She retired as a professor of Latin American history at Muhlenberg College in Pennsylvania, where she taught the colonial and modern history of Latin America, women's history, and Latin history and where she published her research on non-Catholic religious communities in Latin America.

Jorge Castelazo, Treasurer, moved permanently to Guanajuato in 2015. He worked as a librarian in a large research library in Boston for many years, before switching to mainframe computers, where he specialized in systems operation, network, and data security. He is bilingual. His father was born in Guanajuato, his mother was born in Mexico City, and he was born in Los Angeles.

**Ingrid Barradas Bribiesca,** Member-at-Large, moved from Germany to Guanajuato in 1986. Since then she has worked at the University of Guanajuato, teaching courses that range from intercultural communication and cultural tourism to research methodology and business and organizational communication. She currently coordinates the Internationalization of the Division of Economic and Administrative Sciences. Ingrid speaks German, Spanish and English and has been involved with BC since 2018.

The board inherits a vibrant and growing organization. The number of students we support has more than doubled in the last five years—from 12 in 2014 to 27 for the 2019-20 academic year. And, happily, our donor base not only remains strong—it, too, continues to grow. As a result, we voted to increase the annual scholarship to \$24,000 MXN for 2019-20. Additionally, we now pay the fees for up to three class registrations per year (in the past we funded two, even though some universities required three). We will also pay the full cost of "titulacion"—a post-graduation requirement that can be quite costly and gives a student the final professional credential needed to get a good job. Along with 27 students, we also coordinate a corps of 23 mentors who ensure that no student falls through the cracks.

With this expansion, the board is focusing on systematizing our way of doing things. Since the founding of BC, we've relied on the institutional memory of the founders, many of whom remain involved as members. Various roles—ranging from organizing the student applications to managing the food for a benefit—were typically attached to individuals. Starting this past spring, we're focusing on breaking down and documenting the tasks of running and sustaining Brillantes Caminantes and, when possible, distributing and attaching tasks to positions.

For example, the vice president will now be in charge of coordinating student requests for additional support and the member-at-large will manage the documentation of student grades. In the past, both of these tasks fell to the president to manage. We are now recruiting non-board volunteers to fill coordinator roles, which include coordination of mentors, student applications, laptop distribution, development, the newsletter, and more.

Finally, we will create a policy and procedure manual that will document the tasks that make it possible for BC to solicit, screen, and interview students for scholarships; disburse monthly scholarships; coordinate mentors; communicate with our donors and other supporters and friends; produce fundraising events; and myriad other behind-the-scenes details. The result will be smooth transitions for future officers and coordinators and better delineated responsibilities—all in service to our mission of providing Mexican students with scholarships and the support they need to become professionals and future leaders.

## **Psychology Students Present on Depression**

In April, students Abigail Rocha (Psychology, University of León) and Magui Lozano (Educational Psychology, University of Central Mexico) gave a talk about depression.



They noted that depression is very common and is, in fact, the leading cause of disability worldwide. Depression is of two types – recurrent depression and manic-depression. It can range from mild to moderate to severe. Unfortunately, depression sometimes results in suicide attempts.

However, health professionals can offer psychological treatments, such as behavioral activation, cognitive behavioral therapy and interpersonal psychotherapy, or antidepressant medications.

It is important for BC students to recognize symptoms of depression in their classmates and offer support, including suggesting professional treatment.

Each BC student works with a mentor who meets with them regularly, follows their progress, and provides support when needed. Mentors provided updates on the following students.





# Olga Araceli Rodríguez, BC Graduate, Speaks to Students



Olga, or Chely, is a former BC student who graduated in organizational psychology from the Guanajuato branch of the University of Leon in 2015. She is a woman who has managed to succeed in spite of adversity in her life. She currently works for the Secretary of Social Welfare of the federal government.

At the June 2 monthly meeting of students, she gave a talk on the programs that her organization offers to people in the city. One of them is "Insurance for Mothers." All mothers with children under 25 years of age can register in that program, and children will receive the insurance if their mother dies. To register

one only has to show official ID and choose a person to be responsible in the event of the mother's death. Olga emphasized that the program has had to be self-promoting since it has not been publicized anywhere, even though it has been in effect since last year. She plans to go to various communities to distribute information, and she asked for volunteers from among the students to help her.

She also talked about scholarships for students that will be awarded starting in the next academic year. She invited students to sign up for the programs at the office of the Secretary of Welfare. The students were attentive and interested and participated in the discussion.

Olga is an enthusiastic person who has returned several times to participate in our programs, presenting themes of interest to students. She recognizes the support of Brillantes Caminantes and says that because of that support, she has been able to achieve her life's goals.

Our goal continues to be to keep you informed about the work of Brillantes Caminantes and the progress of our students.


## Veronica Says Good-bye
